Additionally, we actively engage in advocacy and provide training to combat gender inequality and violence against women and children.

Specialist Family Violence Counselling

Ensuring that survivor voices are heard, their narratives understood, and their healing supported, is of paramount importance for individuals who have experienced family violence.

Our counselling service is inclusive and open to all individuals who have experienced violence within their family environment, regardless of their backgrounds, ethnicities, genders, or unique family dynamics. Our specialised family violence counselling service consistently receives exceptional feedback from the diverse clientele we serve.

Our clients often express that engaging with Engender Equality counselling aids them in their path toward empowerment, healing, renewed self-assurance, and a deeper comprehension of the intricate dynamics of family violence they have faced.

Predominantly funded by the Tasmanian government, Engender Equality's counselling service is enriched by additional support from generous donations, philanthropic contributions, and revenue generated by our training social enterprise.

Shark Cage™ Program

Supported by the generous assistance of the Jetty Foundation, Engender Equality has successfully implemented several Shark Cage Groups in collaboration with locally based services. New Shark Cage Groups have been held at Tagari Lia, Ptnurra, Uniting and the TAC.

The Shark Cage Framework's primary focus is on empowering women to regain their rights and agency after experiencing abuse and victimisation.

The program seeks to assist participants to recognise unsafe and unhealthy relationships while also promoting agency as they establish personal rights and boundaries within their family and social networks.

Engender Equality values the partnerships established with the organisations that host and frequently collaborate in co-facilitating the program.

These collaborations enrich our organisation by providing established community networks, allowing us to share our expertise with fellow service providers, and to expand access to specialised family violence support.



Shark CageTM Program

"I have come from a childhood of systemic abuse and trauma. I suffered throughout my life from low confidence and self- worth as a result, but never linked it to what I had endured as a child and later as an adult.

The Shark Cage Program has helped me remove the shame and guilt I have felt for many years and laid it squarely at the feet of the perpetrators, or as we know them as, the Sharks in our lives.

The Program has helped us more easily identify those who would harm us and has provided us all with ideas and tools on how to keep ourselves safe, while enforcing our boundaries. It has also been wonderful (but a sad reality) to be able to share this learning experience with others who have been abused by those nearest to them. We have all been able to contribute and share in the Program and have grown in understanding and strength as a consequence.

The facilitators made sure that the program was a safe space for us to share our experiences, without judgement, in a very understanding, healthy and healing environment.

I wish that the Shark Cage Program was part of the curriculum nationwide for all students, as the knowledge provided would prevent and circumvent many people from enduring a future lifetime of abuse.

Social Impact Support

As a specialist service that recognises family and sexual violence as a whole-of-community issue, Engender Equality is dedicated to leveraging community and social action to empower people to make a stand against violence against women. Via the delivery of training to organisations, workplaces, community services, government departments and community groups, we equip participants with the knowledge and skills to recognise and respond to family violence, and embed primary prevention strategies into their everyday lives.

Engender Equality's training is delivered as a social enterprise where proceeds from our training services contribute to our mission of benefiting the community. Income from the training assists in funding the counselling service we offer to victim-survivors of family and sexual violence.

The Elsie Cameron Foundation shares our enthusiasm to grow this part of our organisation to become a self-funding initiative that supports not only our organisation, but our values and purpose in engaging the community to join with us to end family violence. As part of their ongoing support of our organisation and shared vision to achieve this goal, the Foundation has generously funded a full time Social Enterprise and Business Development Manager to steer the social enterprise arm of Engender Equality over 2023-2024.

Engender Equality Fundraising Strategy

Last year, the Jetty Foundation reached out to Engender Equality after recognising an urgent need to address the underfunding of our counselling service.

They proposed a sustainable plan to help us to develop a comprehensive fundraising strategy, and to create a compelling case for support.

Advocates for Change

Entering its fifth year, the Advocates for Change Program provides training and ongoing support to our lived-experience Advocates. The Advocates embark on a meaningful journey to share their compelling stories and expertise with the community, creating systemic change in the ongoing fight against gender-based violence.

Engender Equality has equipped the Advocates to enact change by:

- Actively participating in community events to increase awareness of family and sexual violence.
- **Engaging** with various media platforms to shed light on the issue of gender-based violence.
- Offering **expertise** and insights to **influence** policies and practices concerning family and sexual violence.
- Advocating for legislative reforms that **strengthen** protections against gender-based violence.
- **Contributing** their perspectives and **guidance** in advisory and reference groups at both state and national levels.
- Playing a **pivotal role** in research **initiatives** addressing genderbased violence.
- **Informing** service delivery strategies and policy frameworks at Engender Equality.

The Advocates for Change program is supported by the Elsie Cameron Foundation who subsidise the purchase of gift cards for our Advocates.

Partnerships

Engender Equality partners with several other charities to distribute essential resources and important services to victim-survivors of family violence in Tasmania.



The Nappy Collective

The Nappy Collective is the only Australian not-for-profit that focuses solely on collecting disposable nappies and distributing them to families in crisis. The Nappy Collective collects donations of new and leftover nappies - ones that little ones have grown out of or no longer need - and passes them onto Community Partners that support families.

Escabags

Escabags Ltd is an Australian registered charity who distribute 'Escape Bags' for victims fleeing domestic and family violence. Each 'Escape Bag' contains high-quality products as Escabags understand the importance of feeling comforted and worthy in a crisis. 'Escape Bags' are not gender-specific and, by providing two variations, 'Parent and Child' and 'Single Adult', they cater for all victims of abuse.





Rebuilding Smiles

Supported by the Australian Dental Health Foundation and dedicated volunteer dentists, the Rebuilding Smiles Program assists individuals experiencing dental health problems as a result of family violence and abuse. In 2020 Engender Equality became a member of Rebuilding Smiles and has since supported several clients, across Tasmania.
